Weather in Costa Rica is unlike anywhere else in the world. The country has twelve entirely unique climate zones that range from hot and dry to hot and humid to cold and rainy. Even regions that are geographically close can have completely different microclimates due to elevation and proximity to the equator or the coast.

It can also be said that Costa Rica has two main seasons: dry season and rainy season. Rainy season is commonly known as "green season" because this is when the country's landscapes burst into their fullest, lushest glory. Even when it does rain, it tends to come down hard for just a few hours in the afternoon, with warm, sunny mornings and clear nights.

The official language is Spanish, and Costa Rica also recognises regional indigenous languages like Bribri, Maleku, Cabécar, Bocotá, Guaymí and Mekatelyu.



Solution Currency

The Costa Rican currency is called the colón (plural: colones). US dollars are widely accepted, especially in large establishments like hotels and airports, but have colones on hand for meals and public buses. Cash is king in Costa Rica while some urban establishments will accept credit cards, it's wise to carry cash, especially when travelling to the countryside. ATMs are everywhere, but many close at 10pm.

It's worth noting that Costa Rican cash is absolutely stunning, every banknote featuring gorgeous rainbow portraits of cheerful ecology.



Visa

More than 70 countries and territories, plus all European Union nations, can visit Costa Rica without a visa for either 30 or 90 days. Some guests from countries that need visas to visit can apply for one at the Costa Rica consulate. Other nationalities require a "Costa Rica Restricted Visa", which needs to be applied for by someone else who is already in Costa Rica.

There is something of a loophole though - visitors from countries that need a visa for Costa Rica are exempt from this requirement if they hold a valid tourist visa for the United States, Canada, an EU member state, a Schengen country, Japan, or South Korea.

Festivals

Live some local traditions

Ticos are no strangers to fiestas, parades, and carnivals. Celebrations erupt throughout the year for a diversity of historic, religious, and cultural commemorations.



Fiesta De Los Diablitos

Known also as the 'Festival of the Little Devils', this is an indigenous Boruca celebration that commemorates the triumph of indigenous culture and arts over Spanish colonisation. This celebration features dramatic handcarved and painted devil masks, traditional dancing, food, fireworks, and a theatrical costumed re-enactment of the Spanish-Boruca battle.

Dia de la Anexión de Guanacaste a Costa Rica

A celebration of the annexation of north-western Guanacaste from Nicaragua with parades, bullfights, rodeos, and street fiestas throughout the country. Festivities are focused in the eponymous province but it's a country-wide party.

Taste some local food



Tamal Tico

Tamales are made with masa, or corn-based dough, stuffed with rice, beans, potatoes, vegetables, and meat, then wrapped in banana leaves and steamed. Ticos have been eating tamales for thousands of years, and the ceremony of making and eating them is a Christmas tradition.



Picadillo de Papas

Picadillos are typical Costa Rican fare, and picadillo de papas, or potato picadillo, is a treasure of the northern highlands. Fry chopped potatoes with bell peppers, onions, and ground meat (almost like a hash) and serve with tortillas, rice, and beans for a simple and hearty meal.



Resbaladera


The rest of Central America has horchata, but Costa Rica has resbaladera, a drink so thick and creamy that its name translates to "slide". Made with rice, barley, milk, and spices like cinnamon and clove, it's the traditional beverage of Guanacaste and the perfect refresher on a hot day.



Gallo Pinto is the unofficial national dish of Costa Rica – and one of my favourites! Rice and beans cooked with peppers, onions, and spices, the dish is simple but superb. It's served everywhere, all the time, but especially for breakfast with a tortilla, fried plantains, a side of eggs, and definitely coffee.







Bordering Golfo Dolce is one of the world's most biodiverse marine landscapes, inhabited by dolphins, whales, and bioluminescent algae. Some of the world's tallest and oldest trees grow in the Golfo Dulce Forest Reserve at the top of the bay.





1. Corcovado National Park

Explore Corocovado National Park on a day trip into its beautiful depths. Hike along the beach to the station (La Leona) while a guide points out animals and their habitats along the way. It's common to see several species of monkeys, toucans, macaws, and sloths! Hike until El Bario Point, and then cross the Madrigal River for a chance to swim in its crystal clear water.

2. Snorkelling and Diving Isla Cano

Depart from Colorada Beach in Drake Bay by boat and ride the 8 miles to Caño Island. This area is not only thick with jungle and marine life but also home to one of Costa Rica's premier dive spots.

3. Dolphin and Whale Watching Tour


Dolphins, whales and seabirds play off the coast of Colorada beach, so head out into Drake Bay to meet them. Spotted, bottlenose, common, rough-toothed, and spinner dolphins can all be seen year-round, while humpback whales migrate into Costa Rica only seasonally. Stop by June through September for Southern Humpbacks, and December through April for Northerns.

4. Chocolate Making in the Jungle

Spend the afternoon learning the full chocolate process on a small cacao farm in the jungle close to Corcovado National Park. First learn the process, then try it out! Make a chocolate bar by hand straight from the farm's cacao beans – what better souvenir is there?

Corocovado, it's over 160 meters above the meeting of the Golfo Dulce with the Pacific Ocean, cradled in the pristine jungles of the Osa Peninsula of Costa Rica, there is a paradise. Bosque de Cabo is a romantic retreat and any naturalist's dream come true.



Bosque del Cabo

Crowning a point 500 feet above where the Golfo Dulce meets the Pacific Ocean, nestled in the unspoiled jungles of Costa Rica's Osa Peninsula is a paradise found. Bosque del Cabo is a premier Costa Rica Eco Lodge offering a romantic rainforest getaway and a naturalist's dream come true.

Manuel Antonio

Stretched out across a hilltop, Manuel Antonio is one of Costa Rica's most popular destinations, not least for the view from its heights across the Pacific Ocean and into the rainforest to its back. Some of the country's most beautiful beaches are in this region, offering water sports like kayaking, surfing, sailing, and fishing. The crown jewel is Manuel Antonio National Park – 680 hectares of trekking trails leading to waterfalls and private beaches.





1. Manuel Antonio National Park

Experience the mysteries of the rainforest at Manuel Antonio National Park. Choose between three different trails with a range of physical difficulty, stopping at a halfway point for a leisurely break at Third Beach. Keep an eye out while hiking – the park is famous for its flora and fauna, including three out of four of the country's existing tropical primate species.

2. Cultural Immersion Boruca Tribe

Dive deep into Costa Rica's South Pacific indigenous culture by visiting the Boruca tribe. Take part in a traditional mask-making workshop, learn about Boruca history at a community museum, and finish off the day with a traditional lunch accompanied by a live performance of a famous Boruca legend.

3. White Water Rafting

The Savegre River delivers class 3 rapids and is filled with bends and turns of excitement past scenic jungle views. Spend 2 ½ hours on a raft taming the rapids, taking occasional breaks to rest and admire the landscape. The water calms down towards the end of the trip, offering the perfect opportunity to relax and watch the birds fly by overhead.

4. Catamaran Adventure

Chart a catamaran course from Quepos past Manuel Antonio National Park, drifting by incredible scenes of islands, cliffs, and rock formations. The guide will point out notable wildlife and vegetation, so have a camera ready! Drop anchor at Beisanz Bay for snorkelling, where parrotfish, angelfish, starfish, and even dolphins abound.




Sarapiqui

At the border of Nicaragua, two rivers flow through Sarapiqui, irrigating it into fertility. The region is lush and green, blanketed with farms that produce coffee, corn, cacao, and fruits. The Rio Sarapiqui is an adventure tourism destination prime for white water rafting, and a number of local national parks and nature reserves protect incredible biodiversity and endangered species.



Nicoya Peninsula

The Nicoya Peninsula is a Pacific Ocean paradise, a lazy stretch of mountainous shoreline famous for its excellent surfing and laid-back lifestyle. This is one of the world's five "blue zones", where people live longer and healthier lives than anywhere else in the world. The lifestyle here either causes or reflects that longevity, especially in bohemian Montezuma. Residents focus on art and wellness, surrounded by picturesque waterfalls and thick jungles swollen with life.



Tortuguero

Tortuguero is the gateway to Tortuguero National Park, a critical protected nesting site for loggerhead, hawksbill, leatherback, and green sea turtles. The rain-soaked region is connected by a network of rivers, freshwater canals, lagoons, beaches, and wetlands, all navigable by boat. The forest is ancient, dense, and diverse, supporting hundreds of tree species, thousands of plant species, and a full half of the country's bird species, as well as large rare wildlife like manatees and jaguars.

Puerto Viejo

Puerto Viejo de Talamanca lounges on the Caribbean coast, an endless stretch of beaches to explore including the black-sand Playa Negra. Its low-key and hammocked vibe hasn't inhibited its legendary nightlife one bit. But there's more here than sand, surfing, seafood, and siestas! Visit the Gandoca-Manzanillo National Wildlife Refuge to experience one of the only mangrove swamps in the Caribbean, or the coral reef and shipwreck dive site in Cahuita National Park. The Bribri tribe lives on the Kekoldi Indigenous Reserve nearby, rebuilding the region's population of the endangered green iguanas at the Green Iguana Project.





Costa Rica is wet, and that means **white water rafting** here is superb. Barrel down rivers and through the rainforest, racing around bends embraced by lush green jungle. There's opportunities to try white water rafting in nearly every region, but the Pacuare and Sarapiqui rivers are exceptional options.



Many people come to Costa Rica to see its rainforests – what about seeing them from the treetops? **Zipline** next to an active volcano in Arenal, or head to Monteverde to literally fly through the clouds in one of the world's best-preserved cloud forests.



Much of the country's wildlife is underwater – 3.5% of the world's total marine biodiversity, in fact. **Go diving** in the Catalina Islands of Guanacaste to see coral reefs thriving vibrantly on volcanic formations, or dive with bull sharks and hammerheads in the Bat Islands and Cocos Island.

Culture Enthusiast

Costa Rica is most famous for its flourishing biology, but its human diversity is even more extraordinary.



For thousands of years, indigenous tribes shaped the country now known as Costa Rica, and it's possible to meet a master artist from the Boruca tribe. Learn about the history and culture of the Boruca people through a mask-carving workshop, where wooden masks are hand painted with scenes of legends and daily life.

Painted oxcarts have become a symbol of Costa Rica in general, but this quirky tradition began 100 years ago in Sarchi. See the painted oxcarts of Sarchi to see how this fine art has been passed down for generations, each craftsman adorning oxcarts with completely unique patterns, landscapes, and designs. No two have been the same since the art form began to flourish in the 1900s.



Guaitil located in Guanacaste, preserves one of the last remains of the Chorotega pottery tradition, which refuses to disappear. Chorotega pottery reached its splendour in the pre-Columbian period, and, with the arrival of the Spaniards, it almost vanished. Fortunately, in the town of Guaitil, the cultural heritage of this art has been kept alive, passing from generation to generation until today.

Nature and Wildlife Lover

With 5% of the world's total biodiversity and a commendable commitment to sustainability, Costa Rica is a true paradise for nature lovers.



Hike in Corcovado National Park, a reserve on southwest Costa Rica's Osa Peninsula that protects varied tropical ecosystems. Considered one of the world's most biodiverse regions, its wildlife includes scarlet macaws, tapirs, jaguars and squirrel monkeys. Hiking trails follow coastal and inland routes through habitats ranging from Pacific beaches and mangrove swamps to lowland and montane rainforests.





Whale watching and turtle nesting on the Pacific Coast offers a truly incredible experience! From Dominical to the Osa Peninsula, there are whales to be spotted, and over 100,000 olive ridley sea turtles can take over Ostional's beaches in a single day if you're there at the right time.


Curious Learner

Costa Rica's post-colonial eco-politics and priorities are just as fascinating as its 10,000-year pre-Columbus history.



Explore Costa Rica's commitment to conservation at one of its **wildlife research centres**. Learn about ecology, biodiversity, and sustainability in Monteverde, find out about the rehabilitation of jaguars and iguanas in Puerto Viejo, and understand the nesting rituals of sea turtles in Tortuguero.

Learn the secrets to longevity on the **Nicoya Peninsula**, one of the world's five "Blue Zones" where people live longer than their countrymen – and Costa Ricans as a whole already live longer than much of the rest of the world! Research suggests that longevity is 30% genes and 70% lifestyle – learn the *pura vida* difference in Nicoya.



Much of the country's knowledge about its indigenous heritage was erased by colonialism, but what remains suggests a prosperous region well-populated by a diversity of tribes and cultures. The **Guayabo National Monument** is the only major archaeological site that has been uncovered in Costa Rica. The remains of an abandoned city, populated by 10,000 people and built with paved roads, stone bridges, and aqueducts, are open to the public.

There's a perfect stretch of sand waiting for every kind of beach bum.
